A review of bird specimens (eggs clutches and study skins) collected by William Rae McLennan (1882 - 1935)

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INTRODUCTION



William Rae McLennan (1882 - 1935)¹ Austral Avian Record 5 (1) (1922) (plate between pp. 106-107)

There have been a number of biographies by Whittell (1954), Paton (1979); Noske (2017), and Mason and Pfitzner (2021, 2022) - and general accounts written about William R. McLennan's exploits while professionally engaged by Dr William D.K. MacGillivray (1867-1933), Gregory M. Mathews (1876-1949) and Henry L. White (1860-1927). However, little has been discussed in detail about linking his specimens (bird study skins and egg clutches) to specific collecting locations. MacGillivray (1917, 1918a,b) and White (1917a,b) have recounted his Western Queensland, Claudie River, Qld, King-Roper River, NT and CYP (White 1922a,b) expeditions and generally discussed the specimens that he collected and Archibald J. Campbell (1920, 1922), Alfred J. North (1912) and White (1922a,b) have also published information on individual specimens. Recently, several authors - Greenway (1973, 1978), LeCroy (2008, 2010, 2011, 2014, 2017), Noske (2017), Barram and Scambler (2022), Webster et al. (2022), Crowley and Garnett (2023) and Scambler et al. (2023) - have discussed some of his observations and specimens but until now, no one has attempted to match his diary accounts [Queensland Museum (Brisbane) and RAOU archive (SLV, Melbourne)] to specimens. Most of these specimens are in the Australian Museum, Sydney (MacGillivray egg collection); South Australian Museum, Adelaide (MacGillivray bird study skin collection), NMV, Melbourne (H.L. White bird study skin and egg collections) and American Museum of Natural History, New York (G.M. Mathews bird study skin collection). Interestingly, ever an opportunist, McLennan also collected insects (mainly moths, butterflies and beetles), and the odd reptile and mammal specimen, presumably to sell to supplement his income - we have not attempted to locate any of this latter material. Many of the nest vouchers McLennan collected have not yet been examined or catalogued [pers. comm. Karen Roberts, NMV (Melbourne)], and we look forward to reviewing them in future.

In the following dialogue we have attempted to locate most of McLennan's bird study skins and egg clutches and link them with his diary accounts, to improve the collection location data - which in most cases, is very general on his collection labels (e.g. Coen, and the Claudie, King, Roper, Watson and Archer Rivers). Many of McLennan's specimens have not been attributed to him and we have also identified some specimens which should be attributed jointly or solely to other collectors, including his field assistants, some of them indigenous.

We have not transcribed McLennan's daily diary accounts verbatim, as many of these accounts are extremely lengthy - but instead, we have paraphrased parts of his text to assist us in tying his specimens to specific locations. McLennan utilised the RAOU (1913) Checklist, or occasionally Hall's (1899) Key, for common and scientific names in his diary accounts. We follow the International Ornithological Congress (IOC 2023) for common and scientific names of the museum specimens listed and where appropriate, we have used them in paraphrasing McLennan's diary extracts. Where no specimen has been confirmed, we retain McLennan's common or scientific names. As it would have been too much of a task to tackle the data errors in the Atlas of Living Australia, VertNet and Queensland Government WildNet databases, we have concentrated on correcting the museum database errors and hope that they will flow through to other public outlets online. All the map details have been overlaid on and downloaded from Google Earth.

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Endnote:

1. William (Willrae) Rae McLennan was born at Sandford, ca.10km southeast of Casterton, western Victoria, on 20 August 1882 and died at Casterton, Victoria, on 22 September 1935. Many hundreds of egg clutches and study skins can be attributed to McLennan, during his active collecting years from 1901 to 1923. He "can only be described as one of Australia's outstanding pioneers and field ornithologists of his time" (Mason and Pfitzner 2020: 362).

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CASTERTON, VIC - the beginning of William R. McLennan's collecting career (1901 - 1906)

William R. McLennan's family moved to Casterton [-37 34.615 141 24.486], and it was here in 1898 that he met Dr Ernest A. D'Ombrain who taught him skinning and data labelling.

Some specimens in the Australian Museum (Sydney) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.

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For this account we have integrated information from multiple diaries that McLennan used during this period.

BROKEN HILL, NSW (1906 - 1909)

As Dr Ernest A. D'Ombrain was moving to Sydney, NSW, William R. McLennan, armed with a letter of introduction to Dr William D.K. MacGillivray, moved to Broken Hill, NSW [-31 56.766 141 27.761] in 1906, where he was employed at the local fire station. MacGillivray was later to employ McLennan as a professional collector, initially sending him to Oueensland.

Some specimens in the Australian Museum (Sydney) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.





CAIRNS - ATHERTON, NORTHEAST QLD (November - December 1909)

Arriving in Cairns, Qld on his first professional collecting expedition on behalf of Dr W.D.K. MacGillivray, William R. McLennan journeyed to and collected around the Tolga scrubs, Atherton Tableland, between the 23 and 30 November 1909. In Atherton he met up with George Sharp, a local collector, and Rowland H. Archer, who was on a collecting expedition from Tasmania. Returning to Cairns, William visited Upolu [-16 40.378 145 55.977] and Oyster [= Michaelmas: -16 36.408 145 58.423] Cays, 35km NNE Cairns on 14 December 1909.

CENTRAL WESTERN QUEENSLAND: Cloncurry - Burketown (December 1909 - August 1910)

After several unsuccessful attempts to gain passage to Somerset, CYP, William R. McLennan booked a berth on the *Mourilyan* for Townsville, Qld, arriving on the 22 December 1909. He left for Cloncurry [-20 42.311 140 30.445] by train on the 24th, finally arriving on the 26th. William then spent the remainder of December and early January 1910 on small reconnaissances out from the town, finally establishing a permanent camp near *Sedan Dip ca*. 96km northeast of Cloncurry, on 7 February. He continued to collect around Big Dalgonally Lake [-20 5.038 140 59.585] until 19 April, when he revisited Cloncurry. On the 6 June he departed for Burketown, collecting on the Leichhardt River, from just south of *Coolullah Station*, then moving onto *Augustus Downs*, and across to the Gregory River, which he followed north to Burketown [-17 44.578 139 32.631], arriving at the end of July. Finally taking a passage from Burketown to Thursday Island, Torres Strait on 10 August.

Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews' collection in the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan or are listed under Mathews' name or other collectors. Many specimens both in the AM (Sydney) and the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.






Map 1. Cloncurry, central west Qld (December 1909 - June 1910)




Map 2a. Sedan Dip - Byromine Station, central west Qld (March - April 1910)




Map 2b. Byromine Station - Sedan Dip, central west Qld (March - April 1910)




Map 3. Tommy Creek (just northwest of Cloncurry) - Coolullah Station, central west Qld (June 1910)




Map 4. Coolullah Station – towards Augustus Downs - Gregory River turn-off, central northwest Qld (June - July 1910)

CAPE YORK PENINSULA ERA (1910 - 1911)

After leaving Burketown by steamer on 10 August 1910, William R. McLennan reached Thursday Island [-10 34.804 142 13.087] (Cape York Peninsula) on 15 August and continued to collect for Dr William D.K. MacGillivray around *Somerset* [-10 44.504 142 35.555] (Frank L. Jardine's residence), visiting Bush Islet [-10 42.544 142 35.839], ca.4km north of *Somerset* with Bertie B.A.L. Jardine, in October and November. It was then that MacGillivray & Dr D. Dobbyn visited McLennan briefly at *Somerset*, between 3 and 7 November, before returning to Broken Hill. After their departure, William made *Piara* [-10 43.609 142 33.280] his headquarters, exploring the surrounding countryside, including Lockerbie homestead [-10 47.363 142 27.566] and Peak Point (Cape York Telegraph Station) at the eastern end of Punsand Bay [-10 42.429 142 30.699], until April 1912. During this period he set up a temporary camp at the base of a big hill between Peak Point (telegraph station) and Piara [ca.3km WSW of Piara: -10 44.352 142 31,698].

He also visited the Jardine River at the old river crossing on the telegraph line [-11 9.9061 142 21.338] in April-May, the Hannibal [-11 35.487 142 55.915] and MacArthur [-11 43.666 142 58.587] Islands, as well as Raine Island [-11 35.413 144 2.077], on the outer edge of the Great Barrier Reef in July 1911, where he obtained hundreds of clutches of seabird eggs.

Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews' collection in the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan or are listed under Mathews' name or other collectors. Many specimens both in the AM (Sydney) and the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.

Locations with alternate names: McLennan often spelt Piara as 'Paira' or 'Pyra'; and abbreviated Thursday Island to 'TI'. Ulfa Rock [-10 45.600 142 36.794: 09.10.1910 and 03.11.1910], ca.3km SE of Somerset at the eastern end of Albany Passage, was also known as 'Kypenny' or 'Cypheny' Island or 'Kypay Islet', probably from Kyebe Bay, the small bay on which the Somerset homestead was situated (Shanahan 1897). McLennan also (incorrectly) referred to this site as 'Alpha Rock'. Conversely, McLennan misnamed Alpha Rock [-10 36.728 142 31.114: 11.11.1910], in the Torres Strait ca.15km NW of Somerset, as 'A Rock or Mid Rock'. However Mid Rock [ca.-10.666 142.6], WSW of Mount Adolphus Island, is a submerged reef with no bird nesting habitat; entries in McLennan's diaries clearly refer to Alpha Rock (United States Hydrographic Office 1930; Cook & Steed 2013).

Dating anomaly: After 28 February 1911, McLennan inadvertently continued dating his day-by-day diary entries on to the 29th (not a leap year) and 30th. This dating anomaly continued in his diaries and on his specimens sent to Dr MacGillivray, until McLennan realised the error on about 8 April (letter to W.D.K. MacGillivray, 8 April 1911). We have added the presumed dates to all specimens from this period.






Map 1. Thursday Island, Torres Strait and north CYP (1910 - 1911)

JARDINE RIVER CAMP, CYP (April - May 1911)

After collecting near Somerset [-10 44.504 142 35.555] for seven months, William R. McLennan spent five weeks on the Jardine River in April - May 1911. Based on his diary notes [16.04.1911], he "... went up river 2 miles to Packsaddle Creek and followed it along for some distance ... started to rain again - returned to camp ...". This places McLennan's 'Jardine River' camp on the river, 2 miles downstream from the intersection of Packsaddle Creek [-11 8.767 142 21.100]. His '28 mile camp' was located on the old telegraph line track¹, ca.18km north of the old Jardine River crossing [-10 59.439 142 22.370].

¹We abbreviate the 'old telegraph line track' as 'OTT'

Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews' collection in the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan, or are listed under Mathews' name or other collectors. Many specimens in the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.



RAINE ISLAND EXPEDITION TO THE OUTER EDGES OF THE GREAT BARRIER REEF, QLD (May - July 1911)

After collecting on the Jardine River, McLennan joined H.G. (Bert) Vidgen on his cutter, first sailing to Thursday Island and nearby small islands. En route to Raine Island [-11 35.413 144 2.077], 120km E of central Cape York Peninsula, he collected on the Hannibal Islands [-11 35.486 142 55.975], MacArthur Isles [-11 46.666 142 56.587] and Cape Grenville [-11 57.934 143 14.06]. After a week on Raine Island he also visited the Bird Islands [-11 45.236 143 5.420] and Cairncross Islets [-11 14.482 142 55.276].

Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews' collection in the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan or are listed under Mathews' name or other collectors. Many specimens both in the AM (Sydney) and the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.



Immediately after his journey to Raine Island, McLennan again joined H.G. (Bert) Vidgen on his cutter and made a brief visit to Bramble Cay [-9 8.512 143 52.514], at the far northern end of the Great Barrier Reef, only 50km from the New Guinea coast. Then from late July 1911, McLennan settled in to ten months of intensive collecting on far north Cape York, based around Piara [-10 44.352 142 31.698], Somerset [-10 44.504 142 35.555] and Lockerbie [-10 47.363 142 27.566].

Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews' collection in the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan or are listed under Mathews' name or other collectors. Many specimens both in the AM (Sydney) and the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.



NORMANTON, QLD to CASTERTON, VIC (June - August 1912)

After collecting on northern Cape York Peninsula and the Great Barrier Reef from August 1910 - June 1912, William R. McLennan did not take the direct east coast steamer route on his return south. Instead, he sailed down the west coast of CYP to Normanton in the eastern Gulf of Carpentaria to collect two specimens of particular interest to his patron, Dr W.D.K. MacGillivray, before returning to his home town (Casterton, in Victoria) in August 1912.

Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews' collection in the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan or are listed under Mathews' name or other collectors.

William R. McLennan returned home to Casterton, Vic for a brief spell in August 1912 and again, collected around Broken Hill with Dr William D.K. MacGillivray during September - December 1912. We were unable to locate any diaries or letters for the period 29.08.1912 - 28.04.1913. However, it is evident from MacGillivray's letter to McLennan (28.04.13 and 04.05.13) that McLennan remained in south-eastern Australia during this period and expected to visit E.A. D'Ombrain in Sydney during May before returning to Cape York Peninsula.

Many specimens in the Australian Museum (Sydney) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.

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CAPE YORK PENINSULA (March - May 1913)

On returning to Broken Hill, NSW, Dr Wiliam D.K. MacGillivray again paid (aided by Gregory M. Mathews) for William R. McLennan's voyage to Cape York Peninsula. We were unable to locate any diaries or letters for the period 29.08.1912 - 28.04.1913. However, it is evident from MacGillivray's letter to McLennan (28.04.13 and 04.05.13) that McLennan remained in south-eastern Australia during this period, and expected to visit E.A. D'Ombrain in Sydney in May before returning to Cape York Peninsula.



PASCOE - CLAUDIE RIVERS, EAST CYP (June 1913 - April 1914)

After returning to northern Cape York Peninsula, William R. McLennan then sailed from Thursday Island, Torres Strait, on 26 June 1913. His companions were two prospectors, Alf Mohr (for the whole expedition) and 'Mac' Mackenzie (for four months). They visited a number of islands *en route* and arrived at the Pascoe River (east CYP) on 10 July. McLennan went to Lloyd Island after two weeks because he was short of stores but returned again four days later. Because of the difficulty of gaining access to supplies (see below), in early September he moved camp to the Claudie River, about 11km by boat from the river mouth, closer to Lloyd Island. On 5 November 1913 he was joined there by Dr William D.K. MacGillivray, his 14-year-old son Ian and John A. Kershaw of the National Museum, Victoria. They visited Raine Island on 30 November, returning to McLennan's camp on the Claudie River on 18 December. After visiting Lloyd Island on 10 January 1914, MacGillivray and party finally departed on 30 January. William remained on the Claudie River until 26 March, after which he returned to Thursday Island on 2 April.

Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews' collection in the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan or are listed under Mathews' name or other collectors (e.g. A.S. Meek). Many specimens in both the AM (Sydney) and the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector. We have excluded those specimens attributed to W.D.K. MacGillivray and party, when visiting McLennan at his Claudie River camp - unless they were jointly collected with McLennan, or have assisted us in determining where McLennan was on a particular day when other data was lacking.





ARCHER - WATSON RIVERS, WEST CYP (May - August 1914)

After nine months collecting on the Pascoe and Claudie Rivers, eastern CYP, William R. McLennan was not idle for long. Accompanied by Alfred Mohr, he set forth for the Archer River on the western side of CYP on 21 May 1914. He anchored at the mouth of the Batavia on 24 May, reaching the Archer five days later. On advice of the superintendent at the Archer River Mission station, McLennan set up his first main camp some 30km upstream on the Watson River [-13 12.258 141 55.612]. He then moved downstream to his second main camp [-13 18.912 141 51.327], also on the Watson. He remained there until the latter half of August before returning to Thursday Island, CYP.

Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews collection the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan or are listed under Mathews' name as collector. Little is known about Alfred Mohr, who collected 59 of the specimens on this expedition. A mining prospector from Thursday Island, he had accompanied McLennan to the Pascoe and Claudie Rivers between June 1913 and April 1914, where he collected at least one clutch of eggs. Alf lacked collecting experience and several specimens he shot on the Archer River were too damaged to skin, but he was mostly successful and when helping McLennan search for owls, realistically imitated their calls.

There are no diary records from McLennan between 5 April and 20 May 1914 - presumably he was on Thursday Island organising a vessel to go to the Archer River.

CLAUDIE RIVER, EAST CYP (November 1914 - February 1915)

After a brief stay at *Piara* (including collecting on Thursday Island), William R. McLennan departed on the 11 November 1914. Accompanied again by Alfred Mohr, he proceeded down the east coast of Cape York Peninsula, arriving at Lloyd Island on 23 November. He finally set up camp on the Claudie River in early December, where he continued to collect until 19 January 1915. He then worked along the coast, visiting Lockhart and Olive Rivers before returning to Thursday Island, Torres Strait, on 13 March.

Interestingly, many of the clutches from this expedition have not been attributed to McLennan as collector and many have not been located.





ARCHER - WATSON RIVERS (March - May 1915)

After returning from the Claudie River on east Cape York Peninsula, William R. McLennan commenced his second trip to the Archer and Watson Rivers on the western cape. Accompanied again by Alfred Mohr, he left Thursday Island on 30 March 1915, returning on 5 May. His main camp was on the Archer River [approx. -13 26.124 141 42.706].

Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews' collection in the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan or are listed under Mathews' name as collector. Also many specimens in both the AM (Sydney) and the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.



KING RIVER, NT expedition (September 1915 - January 1916)

Contracted by Henry L. White from 'Belltrees', near Scone, NSW to explore the King River region, NT and the 'great egret heronries' at the Roper River, NT and, to procure bird specimens and their eggs, William set forth from Thursday Island, Torres Strait on 29 June 1915 in the cutter *Avis*, along with two companions (Mark New and Alfred Mohr). His progress is documented by White (1917), in that he reached the Archer River on 5 July, Karumba on 19 July, Mornington Island five days later, arriving at McArthur River on 7 August, where he received useful information from the local constable at Borroloola. Departing from the entrance of the McArthur River on 15 August, William was faced with appalling weather conditions past the mouth of Roper River, not arriving at Port Bradshaw until the last day of August. On 9 September they arrived at the Glyde River, anchored at the Liverpool River on 18 September, finally reaching the King River on the 26 September. They set up a camp about 4.5km upstream from the junction of the north branch of the King River [approx. -11 54.211 133 23.947], where they continued to collect along the river system until 25 January 1916.

Northern Territory locations: On 06.09.1915, McLennan sailed west through the Cadell Strait, East Arnhem, and anchored 6 miles up a river which he named the Goyder. We are confident that this was in fact, the Woolen River (mouth near Banyan Island at -12 14.110 135 9.314). The Goyder River does not reach the coast but runs into the tidal flats of the Arafura Swamp (Muckininnie Plains), above the Glyde River; and on 09.09.1915, McLennan reported sailing 6 miles *further west* along the coast to enter the Glyde. The terrain and habitats he described from 6-9 September are consistent with those of the Woolen River, not the Glyde-Goyder and Arafura Swamp. These landscape features included a ridge 17 miles up river (which we identified from satellite imagery as at -12 23.001 135 19.043) and a rock bar 3 miles further on (-12 24.278 135 20.447), which blocked any further progress. McLennan's misnaming of this river is almost certainly due to reliance on a contemporary map of East Arnhem by Lindsay (1883). Lindsay mapped the upper Goyder River as connecting (through swamps) to the Woolen, not the Glyde; and thus he labelled the lower Woolen River as the Goyder. This mapping error is shown clearly in White's account of the expedition (1917a, plate between pp. 118-119). Our reinterpretation of location affects numerous observations, and one specimen [see text, below], cited by White (1917a, 1917b), Noske (2021) and others.

Most of McLennan specimens from the King River, NT in the NMV (Melbourne) are incorrectly listed as from the Beagle Gulf, ca.60km northwest of Darwin [-12.12 130.4]. Additional specimens from the NMV (Melbourne) and the AM (Sydney) are also erroneously listed as Cobourg Peninsula [-11.366 132.116]. Most of McLennan's specimens in G.M. Mathews' collection in the AMNH (New York) are either not attributed to McLennan or are listed under Mathews' name or other collectors. Many specimens in both the AM (Sydney) and the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.


Map 1. Goyder [=Woolen] and Glyde Rivers, NT (early September 1915)

ROPER RIVER, NT expedition (February - August 1916)

On the return journey to CYP after several months in the Northern Territory, William R. McLennan arrived at the Roper River mouth on 14 February 1916. A fortnight later he reached the 'egret heronries', some 6 miles upstream [-14 42.898 135 18.242]. They departed from Roper River on 11 April 1916 and finally reached Borroloola 9 days later. With failing health, depleted stores and the abscondment of one of his crew, William foolhardily but gallantly attempted to sail for Thursday Island, ultimately returning to Borroloola on 6th May, where he was put to bed suffering from a severe attack of beriberi and ague (probably malaria). White then chartered a lugger to pick up McLennan and return to Thursday Island. Although his health was severely affected into 1917, by early August 1916 William was sufficiently recovered to telegraph his mother and start dispatching his specimens to White, at 'Belltrees', Scone, NSW.

Of all McLennan's expeditions, this one was possibly the most challenging, in that their camp was located on a salt pan opposite the rookery. They were continually subject to swarms of mosquitoes and sandflies and, with depleted food supplies - salted beef, fish, sugar and (white) flour. Also, they were continuously in danger of being taken by a crocodile when wading waist to chest deep in the egret rookery.

Many specimens from this expedition in both the AM (Sydney) and the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector. The locations for several specimens from the SAMA (Adelaide) are erroneously listed as near Mataranka, NT [-14 55.991 133 10.006] and the remainder are generally located on the upper reaches of the Roper River [-14 35.961 134 18.016]. The WAM (Perth) specimens from the Roper River environs are also incorrectly located just to the east of Mataranka [-14 55.003 133 23.567].

BORROLOOLA, NT - THURSDAY ISLAND, CYP - CASTERTON, VIC (May - November 1916)

There is scant information as to McLennan's movements when they left Roper River and initially arrived at Borroloola, NT in April 1916. We have put together a timeline mapping out his whereabouts from when he finally left Borroloola and reached Thursday Island, CYP in about late July, where he recuperated from his ill health. McLennan then arrived at Casterton, Vic in late September 1916.

We believe McLennan and his companions (Mark New and Alfred Mohr) made an incredible contribution to science in this expedition, collecting more than 350 egg clutches (many of the egret clutches have not been located) and 363 bird specimens. They travelled over 2,000km from Thursday Island (CYP) into unhospitable and the least known part of the Northern Territory to the King River, overcoming the treachery of the indigenous inhabitants of the King River (in pilfering their supplies), and the appalling conditions at their camp on the Roper River. It was also a sorry end to their specially designed cutter (*Avis*), which was outfitted for the expedition and served them well.

There is a single clutch of Grey Goshawk in NMV (Melbourne) (BE17849) attributed to McLennan, collected on Cape York Peninsula on 18 October 1916. He has been incorrectly cited as the collector as he was in Casterton, Vic at that time.

YANCO STATION, QLD (January - February 1917)

Once again, William R. McLennan and Dr William D.K. MacGillivray were collecting around Broken Hill, NSW and planned to reach Cooper Creek, southwest Queensland. However, an unforeseen mechanical failure of MacGillivray's vehicle hindered them from reaching their proposed destination, and so most of their five weeks in the field during January - February 1917 was spent near Yanco (then known as Yanko) Station, southwest Qld. William, in a letter to E.A. D'Ombrain (18-19 March 1917) relates a detailed account of their misadventures and collections on this expedition: "I secured 137 skins & the Dr & the 2 boys [Jack Hogg and Ian] got another 50 skins between them. We also secured several sets of eggs, the most to us ('as we had not previously taken them') were the eggs of *Sphenostoma cristatum* [Chirruping Wedgebill] ... Dr & Ian left for Melbourne. I stayed a few days to relabel & pack the skins that we had collected. Then I left for home."

The coordinates we have given are based on archived maps [including Queensland Survey Office (1947)] and details of postal routes (Pugh 1916). Naryilco Station homestead, now known as 'Old Naryilco' [-28 43.539 141 51.681], was on Wirra Wirra Creek, ca.14km WSW of Gibba Lake. It was 14 miles from Yanco homestead (Pugh 1916) along a track following the creek. The expedition camp [-28 36.124 141 53.376] was on Yanco Station, nine miles up Warri Creek from Naryilco homestead and 4 miles south of Yanco Station homestead. They subsequently camped in the grounds of Yanco homestead [-28 33.550 141 54.674] next to Mirra Mirra Waterhole (where the current Naryilco Station is located).

A considerable number of the following specimens in the SAMA (Adelaide) were not attributed to a collector. Those now confirmed to be collected by McLennan have no collector listed and those collected by other members of the party are noted. Those still without a known collector are also noted, however, based on McLennan's comments in his letter to E.A. D'Ombrain, it is presumed that he collected a larger proportion of them. Most specimens listed from the AM (Sydney) have either not been attributed to a collector or have been attributed to W.D.K. MacGillivray.

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

VICTORIA: prior to enlisting (January - February 1917)

William R. McLennan was forever on the move - after going home to Casterton (Vic) [-37 35.157 141 24.223], he spent a few days in Melbourne, then in the company of Dr Edward D.B. Nicholls and Thomas H. Tregellas, collected at Selby [-37 54.899 145 22.426] in the Dandenong Ranges. He later visited Phillip Island, at the mouth of Western Port Bay, Vic [-38 31.112 145 6.660] between the 3rd and 12th March.

Most of the following specimens from Casterton, Vic in the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as the collector [see McLennan's letter, below].

WORLD WAR I: McLennan's diaries (1917 - 1919)

Only days after his trip to Philip Island, Vic, William enlisted on 14 March 1917 (serv. no. 721) with the AIF. He departed for England on 21st June, arriving in August 1917. While on leave from training in England, William and Dr W.D.K. MacGillivray visited Gregory M. Mathews and his collection and William was most impressed, revising his previous opinion of Mathews. He left England for France on the first day of 1918 and served as a Private in machine gun units in France and Belgium until October 1918. It is hard to believe that McLennan actually survived his ordeals on the front line - shells just missed him and he was gassed in the trenches a number of times, but he still returned to the front line.

While McLennan's war diaries are not related to his Australian collecting experiences, they fill in a timeline during his absence from Australia between early 1917 and January 1919. They also give us a further insight to his tenacity, character, and his descriptive experiences while on the front line. A true naturalist, he made records of bird, mammal and insect life even while under fire - according to Embury (1933), he crawled out into no man's land to observe behaviour of birds disturbed by gunfire. The diary includes some long narratives of military actions, but we have only selected small segments to document McLennan's timeline and illustrate his experiences while overseas. While in France, McLennan kept up a regular correspondence with MacGillivray, who served as a Captain [later Major: serv. no. N12065 (422)] at No.2 Australian General Hospital at Wimereux, near Boulogne, and a number of Casualty Clearing Stations near Amiens.

McLennan evidently intended to collect while in Europe - he obtained a blowpipe and darts from G.M. Mathews (see 01.07.1918, below) and took at least one clutch of eggs. However, as of 31 December 2023 we have been unable to trace any specimens taken by McLennan while overseas.

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Archives:

While on active service, McLennan followed his usual practice of making rough notes, then developing them into "full notes" in quiet periods. For the account covering September - October 1918, we have integrated information from rough notes and diary pages. [The notebooks were apparently provided by W.D.K. When you get a look at a large series of birds from all over the continent one soon sees the value of species which is practically nil. COEN ERA, CYP (late 1920)

There do not appear to be any of William R. McLennan's diaries available after he returned from Moa Island, Torres Strait, from 14 April 1920 until August 1920. Due to the influenza that had spread across the top of the cape, McLennan's initial mining explorations to the region might had been delayed for some time. He is later recorded working a gold claim in the Rocky Goldfields, on Neville Creek (which runs into the upper Leo River system), ca.28km NNE of Coen, CYP [approx. -13 42.644 143 18.788].

When McLennan discusses Batavia, it is presumed that he was referring to the Wenlock (formerly Batavia) Goldfield [-13 5.358 142 56.626] - which is *en route* between Coen and Wolfram camp (Denaro & Ewers 1995).

Many specimens in the SAMA (Adelaide) have not been attributed to McLennan as collector.

GROOTE EYLANDT, NT (April - July 1921)

McLennan's next voyage was to Groote Eylandt, western Gulf of Carpentaria, NT. William left Melbourne for Sydney on 15 March 1921, arriving at Sydney to visit H.L. White at 'Belltrees', near Scone to discuss the impending expedition. He returned to Sydney, leaving onboard the *Aki Maru* on the 23rd and arriving at Thursday Island on the 31st. After finally organising the hire of a lugger, its captain, a permit for four Moa Island natives and a shotgun from Harry Collins (McLennan's shotgun was damaged en route to Thursday Island on the *Montoro* and had to be returned to Sydney) they finally left Thursday Island on 20 April 1921, arriving at his destination on 25 April, and remaining until 4 July.






Map 1. Groote Eylandt: all voyages (April - July 1921)




Map 2. Groote Eylandt: Cape Beatrice and south-east Groote Eylandt (April - July 1921)

COEN, CYP (August 1921 - December 1923)

On returning to Cape York Peninsula, William R. McLennan continued to collect material from the Coen hinterland, central east CYP, between September 1921 and December 1923. However, William did return to visit Henry L. White in 1922, leaving Cooktown on about 31 May and arriving at *Belltrees*, Scone, NSW on 18 June. As was his usual practice, McLennan then visited family in Casterton, Vic, before heading to Sydney in late July to prepare for the next expedition. On 12 August 1922 he left Sydney aboard the S.S. *Wyrema*, changing vessels at Cairns to the S.S. *Kuranda* and headed for Cooktown on the 22nd. Due to inclement weather McLennan did not leave Cooktown on the *Suma* until 3 September, finally arriving at Port Stewart on the 6th. He then continued to collect on behalf of White until at least December 1923. During this period, McLennan appears to have sequentially numbered his egg clutches over the number of eggs in each clutch.

Based on McLennan's diary entries (e.g., 5 miles north of Coen), we approximate his Rocky Yard camp at 7km NNE of Coen [-13 53.287 143 10.443]. McLennan several times refers to the 'Peach River' - however, based on the routes he described in his diary entries we list this location as Peach Creek, one of the headwater creeks flowing into the Archer River.

Field assistants:

McLennan forged close links with the local community during his two years based in Coen when collecting on behalf of H.L. White. This is reflected in the number of people who provided specimens or helped him to collect by locating birds' nests, and we have indicated in the text where they should be recorded as collectors or joint collectors of the relevant specimens. Some are unknown - these include local schoolboys recruited as 'egg scouts', one unnamed indigenous boy, and an adult aboriginal known as 'Dumpling', who cannot be identified. Several specimens were provided by local miners or station workers, and the Coen schoolteacher helped McLennan to photograph birds' nests (see text). McLennan also engaged a succession of paid assistants, four of whom actively helped with collecting in the field. The youngest was aged 11 and the eldest (we estimate) was about 50 years old. Crowley and Garnett (2023) noted that three of McLennan's field helpers were indigenous, although one - Chinese-aboriginal stockman Willie Massy (or Massey) - was not a paid assistant - he went out with McLennan for only one morning, at the request of his employer. In the Appendix (below), we provide details of the active field assistants, including new information on the tragic death of Willie Massy in Atherton, north Queensland, in 1930.

There are no further diary entries after 1 December 1922. However, McLennan wrote to H.L. White from Coen, CYP on 22 January 1923, in which he mentions that he was recovering from a bout of malaria. Based on an extract from one of Whites's wires to McLennan, he was finishing up collecting under contract to White and was disposing of some of his equipment while returning specific items to White, as requested ["Dispose surplus best advantage. Return rope ladder Camphor box Labels slips Kodak and Barometer to me writing next week"]. McLennan then mentions that he will not be able to send White the articles requested until the supply boat arrives at Port Stewart about the end of March, or early April.

H.L. White next wrote to McLennan at Coen, CYP, on 23 January 1923, in which he apologises for not writing earlier but the illness of his wife was taking priority. A further letter from White on 25 February 1923 implies that McLennan was still at Coen and would be there for some time ["Address Coen will be there for some time yet."]

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Appendix 1. Details of William Rae McLennan's field assistants in the Coen region, 1921-1922.

The four assistants who helped with collecting specimens (as well as duties with horses, camping, trail blazing etc.) are listed in chronological order of their engagement by McLennan, at wages of 5/- per day (food and other supplies were provided). We also give details of Willie Massy (or Massey), who assisted McLennan for one morning at the request of his employer, Herb Thompson, owner of Rokeby Station. QBDM = Queensland Government Births, Deaths and Marriages (see References, above).

Bob Ross (1871? - 1948?)

Collector of 3 specimens; joint collector of 6 specimens. Field assistant, October 1921 (aged 50?). Bob Ross was indigenous, but there is doubt about his identity - there were at least two indigenous labourers of this name in the area (Crowley and Garnett 2023: 57). However, we believe the relevant Bob Ross may have died at the Cooktown Hospital on 2 July 1948, age 77 years (QBDM 1949/2848). The minister attending his burial was Clarence Leslie Weston, of the Aboriginal Inland Mission.

John Louis (Jack) Bassani (1907 - 1980)

Collector of 1 specimen; joint collector of 4 specimens. Field assistant, November to mid-December 1921 (aged 14). Helped search for Buff-breasted Buttonquail and Golden-shouldered Parrot, but was not a collector of these species. He was later a miner, and a working partner of aboriginal miner Frederick 'Friday' Wilson (Ellwood (2014: 87): this may have been the same Friday Wilson who brought a Brown Snake to McLennan (see 24.04.1922, above). Bassani was born in Port Stewart near Coen (QBDM 1907/C/10017) and died in Cairns (QBDM 1980/54469). His elder sister Mabel later married Coen schoolteacher James Donald (Don) Anderson (Mason & Pfitzner 2020, 2021).

Cecil Rhodes Wilson (1909 - 1980)

Collector of 2 specimens; joint collector of 6 specimens. Egg scout boy (aged 11) to mid-December 1921; field assistant from mid-December 1921 to January 1922, replacing Jack Bassani who had to leave for Port Stewart. Helped search for Buff-breasted Buttonquail and Golden-shouldered Parrot but was not a collector of these species. Born Queensland (QBDM 1909/C/2505) (also known as Cecil Rhodes Jubilee Wilson) and died in Cairns (QBDM 1980/C/54520). He was a miner at the Batavia (Wenlock) and Lukin River goldfields and later a carrier, noted for delivering truck loads of stores to Coen before the wet season closed roads (Anon. 1950).

Tommy Tucker (? - 1931)

Collector of 5 specimens, including one clutch of Buff-breasted Buttonquail eggs; joint collector of 6 specimens, including one clutch of Buff-breasted Buttonquail eggs and two skins of Golden-shouldered Parrot. He was indigenous, from the Coen area, where he was also known as Tommy Charlie (QBDM 1932/C/1419). Field assistant late December 1921 to May 1922 (see also Crowley and Garnett 2023: 57). Tucker helped McLennan find areas of 'anthill flats', the habitats where Golden-shouldered Parrots nest, and helped collect live parrot nestlings for McLennan to take south (Coen typescript; Crowley and Garnett 2023: 60). His local knowledge was also invaluable on the wet season expedition to the Rocky Scrub in February 1922, through thickly-timbered forest with no roads: "...but this was Tommy's country, and he knew every inch of it" [Coen typescript 24.02.1922]. Tucker was born near Coen (date unknown) and died at Ell Creek, near Coen, on 19 October 1931 [QBDM 1932/C/1419 - contra 22 October 1931 (Crowley and Garnett 2023: 57)].


Willie Massy (Massey) (ca. 1892 - 1930)

Willie Massy (also known as Massey) was co-collector of McLennan's first clutch of Golden-shouldered Parrot eggs (NMV BE1418), on 24 April 1922. His age at death was recorded as 38 years (see below), so he was about 30 years old in 1922. He was not a field assistant to McLennan - he was a Chinese-aboriginal stockman, employed on Rokeby Station (Coen typescript: 184) where he was born (QBDM 1930/C/3826). His employer, Herb Thompson, owner of Rokeby, arranged for Massy to take McLennan out to a mustering camp, near where he had seen an active 'anthill parrot' nest the day before. In 1928 Massy was working on Merluna Station (150km NW of Coen) where he was registered on the electoral roll, but by early 1930 his whereabouts were reported as "unknown" by police at Herberton, on the Atherton Tableland (CIFHS 2023; Crowley and Garnett 2023: 57). This indicated that Massy may have been on the Atherton Tableland (rather than Palm Island, as suggested by Crowley and Garnett 2023: 57), and our researches have identified him as dying at Atherton on 27 November, 1930 (QBDM 1930/C/3826). Willie had apparently been working on local farms but tragically, committed suicide when in police custody, after medical assessment for mental illness associated with alcoholism (QBDM 1930/C/3826; Anon. 1930). He was buried in the Rockley Road Cemetery, Atherton, plot E 284 (Tablelands Regional Council: Gwen Price pers. comm.).


Note


1a. Coen - Port Stewart, CYP (late August - early September 1921)




Map 1b. Coen environs, CYP (general overview - August 1921 - December 1923)



Map 1c. Coen environs, CYP (general overview [slightly enlarged] - August 1921 - December 1923)




Map 2. Coen environs, CYP (collecting sites around Coen - August 1921 - December 1923)
